The NFJC is dedicated to enhancing diversity, respect,

understanding, and inclusion in our community. Through its many education programs, advocacy, and special events, our volunteers, Board, and staff work tirelessly in support of this mission.

Our Issues Committee confronts some of the most pressing social issues of today, which this year included a session on bullying in the

Thousands of youth have been served by this excellent program.

# FIRST TIME/LAST TIME

### **A LIFE JOURNEY**

The NFJC's First Time/Last Time Program has experienced countless positive and defining moments in its thirty-one year history. One such moment occurred in 1982, when a young man named Jim, age 17, found himself immersed in the criminal justice system for the first time following an arrest.

Facing an array of serious charges, Jim was placed in the Erie County Holding Center awaiting court appearances. During his time in the Holding Center Jim was seen by a First Time/Last Time Program Counselor

and it was at that pivotal time that intervention began in his life. Jim was a young man struggling with numerous issues including depression, family dysfunction, and alcohol.

Through on-going counseling and steadfast involvement with First Time/Last Time, and successful inpatient treatment for his battle with alcohol, Jim was able to find his voice, his identity, his sense of self. It was the first time in his life that someone was present to listen, to intervene, and successfully assist in the critically important process of re-routing his current lifestyle.

Flash forward thirty years. This once troubled, young first offender is now proudly a contributing member of our community gainfully employed in the field of Building Maintenance. The fabric of this client/ counselor relationship grounded in trust, dedicated hard work, and overcoming personal challenges is the true goal of the First Time/Last Time Program.

# YOUTH AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS



### **COMMUNITY BUILDERS**

The NFJC's Community Builders youth leadership program is a unique and innovative endeavor that seeks to prepare this region's next generation of change agents. Funded by the Peter C. Cornell Trust, and created through a partnership with the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo, Community Builders brings together a diverse group of high school students from across WNY to both examine the issues that affect this region and complete meaningful community service projects in and around the City of Buffalo.

The Community Builders group meets once a month in space generously donated by the Community Foundation. All members have attended at least one of our other youth programs

(e.g., our Sheriff/Youth "Live-In" Camp, "commUnity build" retreats, Youth Leadership Conferences, etc.) and they bring with them a passion for these issues and a desire to do the difficult work needed to build a more just and inclusive Western New York.

Now in its 4th year, Community Builders has partnered with many local agencies to help improve the lives and conditions here in WNY. Last spring, as part of our annual Youth Leadership Conference Series and in cooperation with Medaille College, this incredible group of young leaders produced this region's first ever For Youth/By Youth anti-bullying days. These events brought together over 150 middle and high school youth and teachers for the purpose of devising school-based solutions to the epidemic of bullying. Featuring media presentations, small group dialogue sessions, a creative exercise, and intensive action planning, these conferences helped empower their participants to stand as allies and advocates for those being bullied in their schools.

### COMMUNITY TRAINING WORKSHOPS ON DIVERSITY

The NFJC expanded its community education initiative and ran numerous diversity training sessions for government agencies, businesses, community groups, and organizations in 2011. Based on our model for a Building Awareness Workshop, these programs are fully customizable and are tailored to meet the needs of our clients. We provide strategies for identifying and resolving cross-cultural conflicts, creating an atmosphere that permits open discussion and problem-solving, and developing a new understanding of the motivations and experiences that influence individual styles and decisions in the workplace.

Our motto is "A just community begins with me." and that philosophy of individual responsibility

and empowerment drives our work. The success of our workshops lies in the power of human interaction, and participants speak of the comfortable and enjoyable nature of our programs. We create and maintain a safe environment in which to examine these issues, and use honest and open dialogue between participants to examine the nature and impact of diversity on the WNY community. Our goal is to enhance the relationships between our participants by fostering a spirit of empathy, concern, and mutuality, and client surveys prove the power, effectiveness, and impact of our Building Awareness Workshops.

### ANTI-BULLYING PROGRAMS IN OUR COMMUNITY

The NFJC worked closely with this area's dedicated and compassionate teachers in 2011. We partnered with urban, suburban, and rural faculty from the region's Charter Schools, Parochial Schools, and Public Schools; all of whom are dedicated to creating a healthier and more inclusive learning environment for their students. Teachers understand the impact diversity has on the classroom, and they have engaged with us on ways to alleviate possible tensions, build understanding, and increase cooperation amongst their students.

We have also worked closely with schools on the issues related to bullying. For us, this is a form of discrimination, and we have focused our efforts on ways in which administrators, teachers, students, and families can work to end this epidemic in our schools and communities. Bullying can be a difficult topic to address; it calls for introspection, constant awareness, and decisive action. Our approach works, however, and the faculty we've partnered with have spoken about how our programs are empowering them to make a difference for their students and our community.
